Back-to-school month can be stressful for students, parents and teachers. Gathering, organizing and packing all the necessities for the year is not ideal when trying to enjoy your last moments of sunshine and fun. As your children get ready for the upcoming school year, it's always a good idea to revisit the basics of electrical safety. Here are five electrical safety tips that will help give you and your student a little peace of mind:



OUTLET TIP

Keep your student safe from potential fire hazards by checking if outlets are loose, are missing a wall plate, or become too hot to touch when something is plugged in.



EXTENSION CORD TIP

Dorm rooms or small apartments may not have enough outlets for students to plug in all their gadgets or devices, but extension cords are only meant for temporary use. If an extension cord is needed in the dorm, urge your college-aged kids to unplug it when they are done. Consider purchasing a power-strip with an overcurrent protector – it's the perfect dorm-warming gift!



LIGHT BULB TIP

LED bulbs use 75% less energy than traditional bulbs. If your bright student needs to replace a light bulb and they can't find the required wattage needed, always encourage them to choose an LED bulb under 60 watts – and remind them to flip the switch OFF before attempting a replacement.



CHARGING CORD TIP

Did you know not all charging cords are made the same? It's tempting to purchase cheaper charging cords for a phone or gaming device, but lower prices often mean lower quality and a higher chance of malfunction. Only buy cords certified by your device's manufacturer to avoid damage to the charging port or device itself.



DAMAGED ELECTRONICS TIP


Damaged electronics like broken gaming devices or worn-out kitchen appliances should not be plugged in, so don't send them off with your students! Damaged electronics can shock or electrocute them, while also ruining other cords and electronics plugged into that outlet. Don't risk it. Either repair or replace broken electronics.

The board reviewed and approved the minutes of the May 25, 2023 board meeting.


Abby provided an update on the GRIP grant submission.

RASPBERRY CHOCOLATE MINI MUFFINS

1 egg

• 2/3 cup flour

• 1/3 cup sugar

• 1 tsp. coarse sugar

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp. baking cocoa
- 1/4 cup boiling water
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 4 tsp. seedless raspberry jam
- 2 tbsp. chopped, sliced almonds

Directions:

Dissolve cocoa in water; let stand until cool. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg. Combine

flour and baking powder; add to creamed mixture alternately with cocoa mixture. Fill paper-lined mini muffin cups half full. Drop 1/4 tsp. of jam into the center of each; cover with two tsp. batter. Sprinkle with almonds and sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 -12 minutes. Cool for five minutes before removing from pans to a wire rack. Serve warm.
